Course Title: Advanced Fire Police (FIPA)

Length of Course: 16 Hours

Lecture/Lab Breakdown: 12/4

Prerequisites: FIPO

Course Goal: To set forth facts that fire police training must be in depth, continuous and expanding; that only persons with intelligent dedication can meet the strict demands required for this type of duty assignment.

Description of Course: This course will touch upon training and the training officer's qualifications, policy & procedures, legal liabilities, court appearance, leadership, communications and public relations, defensive driving, traffic control, security, selfprotection and uniforms.

Description of Methodology to be used: (Brief) Problem solving - class discussion. Demonstrations of accident reporting - recording student's report. Review/tests - student corrected.

Student Equipment/Supply Needs: Training Manual: Beyond the Basics for Fire Police. Notebook & Pencil.

Equipment/Audiovisual/Supply requirements: VCR & Monitor, Chalkboard, Tape recorder with microphone & tapes (for student reporting), and Display Table (for training aids).

Course Objectives (specific):

- 1. To show that more than basic training is required and the consequences for lack of training.
- 2. To show that training courses must be relevant, up-to-date & continuous.
- 3. To show that instructors must be qualified so that the courses they teach will be legally acceptable.
- 4. To show that fire police can be sued for improper performance.
- 5. To show the basics of leadership, responsibilities and liabilities of a supervisor.
- 6. To show need for communications & public relations.
- 7. To show that defensive driving & first responder duties must be a training priority.
- 8. To show that traffic control is hazardous and NOT routine.
